2008 Teen Dating Violence Fact Sheet

National Statistics

- 1/3 of teens report experiencing abuse in their romantic relationships, including verbal and emotional abuse.¹
- 1/5 of teens report being physically or sexually abused a boyfriend or girlfriend.²
- 40% of girls age 14-17 report knowing someone their age that has been beaten or physically hurt by a boyfriend. 3
- Girls and women between ages of 16-24 are the most vulnerable to domestic violence, experiencing the highest per capita rates of non-fatal intimate partner violence.4

Local Statistics

- In 2007, there were 1,501 domestic violence related police reports filed in Oakland involving a youth between the ages of 12-24. This means that one third of the total dating and domestic violence calls in Oakland involved the city's youth. 5
- In 2005, four of the seven domestic/dating violence-related deaths in Alameda County were teen victims.⁶
- In Oakland Unified School District (OUSD), the number of middle and high school youth receiving teen dating violence prevention education has dramatically declined in recent years. In 2007, 4% of youth received 1 hour of dating violence prevention education, and 3% received 2-6 hours of prevention education. Over 90% of OUSD middle and high school students received no dating violence prevention education at all.7

Results of Internal Study Conducted by Task Force

- A study of 232 youth ages 14-24 in Alameda County revealed that 43.5% of youth reported being intimidated, physically hurt, and/or emotionally abused by a boyfriend or girlfriend when specifically asked about an abusive behavior. 8
- Of these 43.5% only 23.7% of youth directly answered yes, to the question of whether or not they a boyfriend or girlfriend had ever been abusive towards them; demonstrating a lack of awareness of what abusive behaviors are.
- Of the 43.5% of youth 22% reported being physically abused, 25% reported being intimidated, and 24% reported being threatened by a boyfriend or girlfriend. 8

Additional Facts

- Teens who are involved in abusive relationships are substantially more likely than their classmates to bring guns to school and three times as likely to be involved in a physical fight.9
- Teen victims of relationship violence exhibit increased rates of eating disorders; high-risk sexual behaviors; and increased teen pregnancy and suicide rates.¹⁰
